What we need to do in 2026 and beyond

You can see from the figures on the inside of this card that the church is heavily dependent on donations from church members. That's everyone who sees St Mary's as their church.

Delivering our Church and Churchyard project is taking a lot of money and time. The work to secure the roof will be finished in early 2026, and so we will be able to turn with more energy and money to the Church's mission, striving to share God's love for all people. So, we want to:

- Meet all our needs for continuing as before: paying Common Fund for our rector, settling all the running costs of the church and church halls, and making modest donations to local and Christian charities
- Pay our church workers an increase for inflation
- Buy a screen and projector for the church and the halls
- Continue to host Winter Shelter guests and the toddler group, Acorns, at our own cost
- Make repairs and improvements to make our halls attractive to more paying users

In addition to this, we need money to meet the inevitable cost of repairing and improving our church, and keeping it in good order.

Everyone is able to give as we have all freely received. We may not perceive ourselves to be "rich", but everyone can give generously in proportion to what they have.



Our forecast income for 2026 is £181,550


